- Breizh Cola (yep, Bretagne is the only place in the world where Coca-Cola does not lead the soft drinks market).

A **student ID** will get you discounts in some museums and free entrance in others. If you have ISIC card, you can also get discounts at fast food restaurants such as Macdonald's or so (but you have to ask for it).

The **weather** in Bretagne is the basis of most jokes made by French people. The climate is mild and at this time of year you are as likely to see the sun every day as you are to feel a few drops of rain.

Although **strikes** are quite common, don't be intimidated, it's as normal as buying a baguette.

#### Don't forget to bring

- Sleeping bag and pillow
- Clothes for parties: it could get wild, and we don't want your best clothes to be destroyed
- Clothes that resists to rain: raincoat and waterproof shoes
- Personal sanitary products: toothbrush, shampoo, towel ...
- Camera: in case you want to make sure that all those precious memories will be preserved. You can't always count on your own memory
- ID Card or Passport
- Visa (If needed)
- Medical and travel insurance (European Health Insurance Card (EHIC), if you come from the EU).
- Money and credit card
- Student card (for the discounts)
- Your personal medication (Without prescription you can buy painkillers, allergy meds etc., but not much more)

Food for the international evening : in BEST events, there is a tradition that every participant brings something from their home country for International Evening (IE). Then we everything and get to know the different cultures a little better. But please take into account that the cooking facilities are limited. There are also shops in France, so you don't have to bring everything with you; we have the basic stuff here. In case you doubt if we have some ingredient that you need, just ask. # How to get to the meeting point?

#### ENSTA Bretagne, Rue François Verny, 29200 BREST

#### $\rightarrow$ By plane

- Take the bus 40 to Porte de Guipavas.

- Once there, take the tram A (it's the only line). Porte de Guipavas is the terminus so there is only one direction. If you see a tram, just jump in it! It's the right one. And then jump out at Pontanezen.

- From Pontanezen tram station follow this path

#### ightarrow By train

- Once at the train station follow this path (8 min) to reach the tram

- Take the tram in direction of Porte de Gouesnou and you may arrive at Mesmerrien (approximately 20 minutes)

- Once at Mesmerrien tram station, you have less than 5 minutes to walk to reach ENSTA Bretagne, following the second itinerary
